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Egerton University at the Centre of The Big 4 Agenda

The 38th Graduation Ceremony

Egerton University is part of a major collaborative effort that brings together the Government with leading universities in the country in an effort to jumpstart The Big 4 Agenda in a wide range of critical areas. On 30 April 2018, the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation led by the Cabinet Secretary, Hon. Mwangi Kiunjuri, signed a collaborative framework with the Vice-Chancellors (VCs) of four public universities. The framework marked the culmination point of a meeting that the Cabinet Secretaries (CSs) and Principal Secretaries (PSs) in the Agriculture & Irrigation, and Water & Sanitation

ministries, had held with the VCs of Egerton University, Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT), Moi University, and the University of Nairobi, on 15 and 16 January 2018, at which the foundation for the collaboration had been laid and a Project Steering Committee formed.

The framework outlines the modalities for technical cooperation and research in the implementation of the food and nutrition security projects prioritised in The Big 4 Agenda. The joint activities identified are in the following broad areas: agriculture and



irrigation; governance, capacity building, and skills upgrading; extension services; technology development and transfer; sharing of facilities; technical cooperation; review of legislation, regulations and policies; knowledge development; and monitoring, evaluation and reporting.

The Government is undertaking to transform Kenya through The Big 4 Agenda initiatives as follows: (i) increase manufacturing to 15 per cent of the GDP; (ii) commit to 100 per cent food and nutrition security; (iii) achieve 100 per cent affordable health care, and (iv) ensure affordable housing through the implementation of the one million homes programme.

It was within the context of the 100 per cent food and nutritional security agenda that the Government decided to partner with the four public universities to ensure all the irrigation schemes in Kenya are operating at optimal capacity. The CSs in charge of the two ministries undertook to enter into collaboration with the four public universities in order to tap into their diverse expertise in the areas of water

storage (dams and hydrology), agricultural production, and cost and risk assessment of the ways in which Kenya can rapidly optimise irrigated agriculture at minimal cost.

Among the schemes for collaborative effort are the Galana-Kulalu Food Security Project, Public Irrigation Schemes, and Agriculturally Productive Lands.

The universities, the state departments, and the relevant state agencies established Thematic Working Groups (TWGs) with clear terms of reference, work plans and budgets. Six TWGs were formed with one of them, the Project Management Team (PMT), responsible for overall coordination.

Since its inception, the PMT has facilitated technical field visits and TWG meetings in Nairobi and elsewhere. In addition, the PMT is coordinating the following activities: the preparation of a roadmap for the commercialisation of the 20,000-acre Galana-Kulalu land; the review of the current land-lease issues and the drafting of relevant recommendations;

and the assessment of the prospective use of the High Grand Falls (HGF) Dam and of the current irrigation status across the country.

According to the National Water Master Plan (2030), Kenya's irrigation potential is estimated at 1,913 million acres (765,575 hectares) when all the water available in the country is put into consideration. Out of this potential, 484,000 acres (188,000 hectares) have been developed, translating into some 25 per cent. Thus there is urgent need to enhance the utilisation of water resources for irrigation purposes. The Vision 2030 has already laid the foundation for the development of 100,000 acres (40,000 hectares) annually. Among other things, the collaborative framework is driven by the determination on the part of the partners to fulfil that responsibility.

Egerton's VC, Prof. Rose A. Mwonya, is optimistic that with its rich heritage in agriculture, Egerton University will effectively contribute to The Big 4 Agenda.





President Uhuru Kenyatta Doctoral Scholarships Programme Launched

President Uhuru Kenyatta presided over the launch of The Aspire to the Zenith: President Uhuru Kenyatta Doctoral Scholarships Programme on 12 March 2018. The scholarships programme will benefit at least 100 Kenyans and is co-ordinated by the Directorate of Confucius Institute at Egerton University, Njoro. The programme is sponsored by the Chinese government.

President Kenyatta presented the scholarship awards to the first 18 beneficiaries at the event held at State House in Nairobi. He said that the scholarship was a culmination of the cordial relations between Kenya and China that had blossomed for centuries. The scholarship programme will offer 60 Kenyans direct admission into Ph.D. training in agriculture and engineering, while another 40 will join master's degree studies. Present during the event were China's Ambassador to Kenya Liu Xianfa, Education Cabinet Secretary Amina Mohamed, Egerton's

Vice-Chancellor Prof. Rose A. Mwonya and Confucius Institute Director at Egerton, Prof. Mohamed Abdille.

The Directorate of Quality Assurance (DQA) takes this opportunity to congratulate all graduands on this important day. This is a culmination of your hard work, discipline and self-sacrifice - virtues

that you should uphold continuously. DQA envisions to be a centre of excellence in the creation and cultivation of a culture of continuous quality improvement in the University.

DQA routinely conducts Teaching Effectiveness Evaluation (TEE) and Practical Instruction Effectiveness Evaluation (PIEE) in line with the Commission for University Education (CUE) Universities Standards and Guidelines (2014), PROG/STD/15 that require every Lecturer/Technologist to be evaluated at least once in an academic year. The DVC (AA)'s office, in conjunction with DQA, is launching the new Teaching Effectiveness Management System (TIEMS) whereby the evaluation will be done online, saving time as opposed to the manual system. TIEMS piloting is ongoing.

The Directorate targets to improve the University's quality of education index by coordinating self-assessment of academic programmes. This will also ensure compliance with CUE University Standards and Guidelines (2014) (PROG/STD/20). Teams from various departments who will undertake the evaluation have been trained and the evaluation is ongoing.

The Directorate has so far carried out three audits of academic procedures and processes in the 2017/2018 academic year for enhancement of quality. In addition, DQA is currently preparing a summary report of the 2016/2017 academic year External Examiners' reports. This assures the maintenance of high standards of examinations in the University and serves as a means of benchmarking with the standards of other academic institutions.

Message from the Coordinator

On behalf of the ISO Secretariat, it gives me pleasure to join the Egerton University Community in celebrating this great occasion that marks an important milestone in a scholar's life cycle.

As we all know, ISO is an acronym for the International Organisation for Standardisation. The organisation has developed standards that offer practical tools that enable organisations to make guaranteed positive contributions to the world we live in. The ISO Secretariat at Egerton University has the sole responsibility of overseeing the successful implementation of three standards at the University, namely: ISO 9001 Quality Management System; ISO 14001 on Environmental Management System and; and ISO 2200 on Food Safety System. It is important to note that Egerton University is among the few institutions of higher learning in the region that have implemented all the above three standards.

During this occasion, it is important to remind ourselves about the benefits of implementing standards at Egerton. The University was certified on ISO 9001: 2008 in 2009. The successful implementation of ISO 9001: 2008 since then has enabled the University

to streamline its operations in all spheres, including academic, research and administration. This has consequently led to efficiency in our services and improved the quality of our products. Market surveys have revealed that Egerton products in the academic and research spheres are well received.

In 2013, the University defined and launched an Environmental Management System (EMS) based on the ISO 14001:2004 standards. The launch and implementation of ISO 14001 was driven by the University's desire to take a proactive approach to managing environmental issues. Through ISO 14001, the University developed a framework for sustainable environmental management practices that will enable us to better manage the impact of our activities on the environment and at the same time demonstrate sound environmental management practices. It is important to note that it is through this initiative that the University community continues to play a key role in the rehabilitation of the Mau Ecosystem and Njoro River, just to name a few community activities that the University has a stake in.

In the long run, the implementation of ISO 14001 will enable the Egerton community and alumni to save on water, energy and other resources. We therefore encourage all our graduates to continue being our environmental ambassadors wherever they go. Although certification of conformity to the standard is not a requirement of ISO 14001, the University intends to apply for certification in the next financial year.

Egerton University has established, documented, implemented and maintained a Food Safety Management System (FSMS) since 2009, when it was certified. The FSMS arose from the need by the University to demonstrate its ability to control food safety hazards in order to ensure

that food is safe at the time of human consumption.

The implementation of ISO 22000 at our Guilford Dairy Institute has led to many benefits. For instance, the standard has helped to create a culture of quality consciousness at all levels of yoghurt production. Consequently, Egerton University has over time delivered high-quality yoghurt, to the satisfaction of our customers. Students who have gone through the Dairy Institute have proven to be of high calibre and with the required competencies.

To enable efficient implementation of the above standards, the University has sponsored a number of its staff to undergo training as Internal Auditors and Lead Auditors in respective standards. So far, the Quality Management System has trained nine Lead Auditors and 70 Internal Auditors. The Environmental Management System has trained 22 Internal Auditors and 9 Lead Auditors. Finally, the Food Safety Management Systems has trained 18 Auditors. Consequently, the University is now endowed with a well-trained human capital required for the establishment, implementation and continual improvement of the respective ISO standards.

In the next University Strategic Plan, the ISO Secretariat proposes to expand its mandate so as to offer training programmes and technical assistance to organisations in the private and public sectors intending to develop and implement the same standards.

Ladies and gentlemen, it would not be an overstatement for one to conclude that Egerton University is on the right track towards becoming a world-class university for the advancement of humanity. At ISO Secretariat, it gives us great pleasure to be associated with this achievement. Viva Egerton!

Message from the Dean

On behalf of myself and the entire Faculty of Agriculture (FOA) fraternity, I heartily congratulate all the graduands of the 38th Graduation Ceremony being celebrated today for their commendable academic accomplishment. We are indeed proud of what you have done during your study time in the FOA and unreservedly wish all of you the best as you begin your next phase of life. In earning a Diploma or Degree, you have finally gained useful academic and social experiences that provide a very strong career foundation and problem-solving competencies for future endeavours. As you enter the job market and the ever-growing pool of alumni, your valued contribution towards the continued improvement of FOA's curricula for enhanced practical-orientation and student-centeredness is welcome.

As we celebrate your academic exploits and passage into the ever-growing alumni and collaborative networks, I wish to share with you some of the major Faculty scholarly and curricula development initiatives of great significance to future students and society. Of interest is the special focus on the empowerment of youth through agri-enterprise development and incubation for improved livelihoods and economic prosperity. Towards this effort, Prof. Patience Mshenga has done FOA proud by competitively winning a RUFORUM grant to implement a project titled

“Empowering Kenyan Youth through Agrienterprise Incubation for Improved Livelihoods and Economic Development (AGLEAD)” for the next three years.

Secondly, the Faculty is at an advanced stage of entering into a tripartite collaboration with the County Government of Nakuru and East African Breweries Ltd (EABL) to implement a MasterCard Foundation (MCF)-supported CARP Plus Project titled “Cassava Value Chain Upgrading for Secure Food, Nutrition and Resilience of Smallholder Farmers in the Arid and Semi-Arid Lands (ASALs) of Nakuru County.” The CARP Plus project, led by Prof. Richard Mulwa, is aimed at developing the cassava value chain and cassava-based beer, animal feed formulations and other industrial products.

Thirdly, an international multi-institutional collaboration involving Egerton University, the Natural Resources Institute (UK), the Nelson Mandela-African Institute of Science and Technology (Tanzania), and the Lilongwe University of Agriculture and Natural Resources (Malawi) has won a BBSRC-GCRF Sustainable Agriculture for Sub-Saharan African grant to implement a project titled “Natural Pest Regulation on Orphan Crop Legumes in Africa (NaPROCLA)” for the next three years. The above-mentioned and other projects in the Faculty have strong capacity-building components for students, staff and agricultural value chain actors. A total of 25, 50 and 12 scholarships will be awarded to Undergraduate, Masters and Doctoral students during the 2018/2019 academic year.

In a recent joint forum, two World Bank-supported centres of excellence, CESAAM (Kenya) and CREATES (Tanzania), successfully developed 10 new short courses to be mounted regionally by Egerton University (Kenya) and NM-AIST (Tanzania), starting June 2018. The short courses (modules) to be offered include Agricultural Value Chain

Development (AVCD), Business Plan Development, Conservation Agriculture, Postharvest Handling of Durable Agricultural Products (PHH-DAP), Postharvest Handling of Perishable Horticultural Produce (PHH-PHP), Sericulture, Apiculture, Dairy Cattle Production (DCP), Animal Feed Formulation (AFF) and Food Processing and Preservation. The farming community is advised to take advantage of these courses to enhance their capacities and venture into commercially viable agribusinesses.

FOA has continued to forge and strengthen new and existing public-private partnerships for specialty guided excellence in agriculture, agrotourism and university-industry exchanges (staff and students). These initiatives have special spin-off benefits in the areas of student-led extension services (through farmer level attachment/internships), job placement, staff exchange and sharing of facilities for Research for Development (R4D). To this end, the Faculty has forged a strong collaboration with Yara EA Limited that assures several fresh FOA graduands (diploma and degree) of securing internship and job placement. Courtesy of CESAAM and CARP Plus projects, the Faculty now has mutually beneficial memorandums of understanding (MoUs) with EABL, Community Action for Rural Development (CARD) and Syngenta Foundation, among other organisations, for the benefit of students, staff and society in general.

The Faculty remains pivotal in making significant contribution towards the realisation of the University's Vision of being a “World Class University for the Advancement of Humanity” through scholarship and leadership in agricultural training, research, innovation and agri-business. In the past six months, the Faculty engaged the farming community and stakeholders through dissemination and translation of a number of proven agricultural technologies and products to the target end users. My first contact with the University dates back to 1998, when I was admitted by the then Joint Admissions Board (JAB) as an undergraduate student. Due to the serene environment and my keen interest in the field of Kiswahili and Sociology, the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (FASS) offered the ideal environment for the pursuit of my studies. Little did I know that my academic journey had just taken off. FASS was, has been, and is still my home.

After the four years of undergraduate study crowned with a First Class Honours degree and completely satisfied with my stay, I decided to return and further advance my

Kiswahili studies, registering in 2003 for an M.A. Kiswahili by thesis. As I progressed with my studies I appreciated the fact that the courses and classes were mostly interactive and not purely theoretical, with opportunities for written essay assignments, educational trips and conferences.

This experience made me realise that at the undergraduate level, the emphasis is more on research skills and that it is all about getting the core basics of knowledge. The postgraduate level is more independent: you do independent research projects and, more often than not, you let your passion come out. In my opinion, it is crucial to have both, because when you are an undergraduate

student you learn what you are interested in, and then, at postgraduate level, you undertake research independently every day, primarily by engaging in writing and critical reading.

This experience and discovery was very tempting, and in 2011, after a brief stint working, I came back to Egerton for my Ph.D. in Kiswahili. On registering, I spoke to my lecturers in my department, who were very supportive and gave me good advice. I settled for an analysis of language use among adolescents. In time we built a good academic relationship with my supervisors. Out of their knowledge in the field, they assisted me in fine-tuning the topic to a researchable


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endeavour entitled “Peo na Mikakati ya Kimazungumzo katika Uumbaji wa Ujinsia Miongoni mwa Wazulufu nchini Kenya” (“Frames and Discursive Strategies in the Construction of Sexuality among Kenya's School-going Adolescents”). The findings from the research are well-articulated in Kiswahili and readily available at the University's Graduate School.

The advice I would offer to prospective postgraduate students is that they should start thinking about their dissertation topics early, beginning with identifying their topics, developing a keen interest in them, undertaking preliminary reading on them, and establishing a good working relationship with their supervisors.

As importantly, managing one's time with respect to the on-going research is crucial. For example, if you wander away from the work for a month at the beginning of the semester you will, more likely than not, miss three-to-four weeks that could have been used for crucial studying.

Generally my experience both as an undergraduate and postgraduate student has been positive. The challenges I encountered occurred mostly outside of the academic programme. The University's broad academic curriculum and high-quality education, as well the serene, multi-cultural environment of its Njoro Campus, are ideal for serious academic work.

Department of LLL Spearheads Mapping of African Languages

While there exists a large and growing body of scholarly work on African languages, there is very little writing on the languages that examines them from the point of view of the “cultural experts” themselves – that is, the members of Africa's linguistic communities who derive their primary expertise on the languages from their practical experiences as day-to-day speakers of the languages.

Since 2017, the Department of Literature, Languages and Linguistics (LLL) has been developing a project that seeks to undertake research on all African languages in an attempt to fill that intellectual gap. The project seeks to replicate on the African continent a similar project that was undertaken in

India over the last ten or so years under the direction of Prof. Ganesh Davy of Baroda University.

On 27-28 February 2018 the Department organised a seminar that brought together scholars from Egerton and other Kenyan universities, such as Moi and Kenyatta, to incubate the project. In attendance was Prof. Davy, who travelled all the way from India specifically to participate in the seminar.

The aim of the project is to map all African languages on the basis of the views of the respective cultural experts. The information will consist of the cultural knowledge of the communities as encapsulated in key

linguistic concepts, such as their grammar and their phonological origins.

The project will cover all African languages, including the languages of East Africa, Central Africa, Southern Africa, Western Africa, and Northern Africa. The work will take seven years to complete, and the end result will be five series of volumes on African languages, together with accompanying indexes. It will be headquartered in a “Continental Project Coordinating Office” to be housed in LLL and will have “Regional Coordinating Offices” and teams in each African region. The coordinator of the project is Dr. Dishon G. Kweya.

FEDCOS and FASS Partner with the Rift Valley Reading Association

Egerton University, and in particular the Faculty of Education and Community Studies (FEDCOS) and the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (FASS), have partnered with the Rift Valley Reading Association (RVRA) to lay a strong foundation for bright and needy primary school children in the neighbourhood of the University. This has been made possible through the establishment of LitClubs in 10 primary schools. The mission of this formation is to advocate for literacy and promote a reading culture among Kenyan youth.

The goal of the project is to empower primary school children by encouraging them to explore their communities and environments, participate in positive activities and tell their stories. This is cultivated by taking the pupils through a two-year mentorship programme aimed at developing seven strengths: Friendship, Belonging, Kindness, Curiosity, Confidence, Courage, and Hope.

The schools participating in the project are Kilimo, Egerton, Mwigito, Tengecha, Ndege, Subuku, Njuguni,

Cheptoroi, Ngongogeri, and Utafiti. Each of the participating schools has a LitClub comprising 15 children, aged between 9 and 12 years. Each club meets for a two-hour session each week in their respective schools under the leadership of a mentor, who is a lecturer at Egerton University and a member of RVRA. The participating schools have appointed contact teachers to work with the University mentors.

To further develop a reading culture in schools in Njoro Sub-Country, RVRA

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Partnering with RVRA

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will conduct a teachers' workshop to be hosted by the FERD on 25 June 2018. The theme of the workshop is "Harnessing the Diversity of Active Language Teaching and Learning".

The workshop targets English and Kiswahili teachers of Standard Four to Eight. The topics to be covered are

Teaching of Grammar, Enjoying of Poetry-Children's Compositions and Performances, and Composition Writing and Scoring for KCPE

One accomplishment in 2018 of the RVRA – through the LitClubs in partnership with FEDCOS, FASS and the Njoro Sub-County Education

Office – is the establishment of the Njoro Community Library in Njoro town ("kwa Chief"). The library is well stocked with books for primary and junior secondary students and will serve as a great resource centre for pupils during weekends and holidays.

The Power of Teamwork: The Story of Mr. Paul*

“Journey” is a great word for the path that Mr. Paul walked to arrive at his Diploma in Agricultural Education and Extension (AGED) in the Department of Agricultural Education and Extension, FEDCOS. Life threw many challenges, doubts and tragedies at him along the way but despite all he made it through. Please join us in celebrating his amazing success story. We hope that his story will inspire you to accomplish even what seems impossible.

Mr. Paul joined the Department in 2009 and in the course of his studies he developed a psychiatric problem. The problem drew the attention of the AGED Department, Medical Department, and Counselling Department. This psychiatric condition derailed him from completing his studies in good time. His classmates left him behind, having graduated. When his condition worsened, he had to defer his studies, for he could not sustain the classroom environment. After one year or so, he resumed his studies. He was disillusioned and disoriented but he managed to scrape through.

After coursework, Mr. Paul had one major hurdle to deal with. This was teaching practice. This is where the Department came in and made a decision to go out of its way to assist Mr. Paul. He could not handle a school environment. No school could accept him. He was unkempt and badly groomed. So members made contributions both financially and materially to improve Mr. Paul's image. Mr. Paul was also taken through guidance and counselling at the Department and encouraged to behave in a socially acceptable manner.

Then Mr. Paul had to undertake micro-teaching. Since he was off the teaching practice season, his lecturers became his students. He did a number of micro-teaching sessions, his performance was critiqued until the members felt he was ready to manage a class on his own. The next step was to secure a teaching practice school. A nearby school was found so that he could be monitored closely. The school in question was Ndege Secondary School in Njoro Township. The Principal, Madam Magaki, who was briefed about Mr. Paul's condition, accepted to work with him and assist in all ways she could. She prepared her staff to cooperate. Mr. Paul was offered all the help he needed. His best help was himself. He was always punctual; he did his best in all ways. Mr. Paul effectively taught the assigned subjects, agriculture and biology, without fail. He also taught mathematics, which was over and above what he was required to do. Students loved him. The Principal praised him in her report, saying that Mr. Paul was respectful and took advice seriously; he was open and when he needed something, he asked for it. Both the Principal and the lecturers in the Department continued to be by Mr. Paul's side, financially and otherwise. Mr. Paul was assessed several times to ensure he was prepared well for the teaching profession. The lecturers never demanded payment for Mr. Paul's teaching practice assessment. They are proud of being part of Mr. Paul's success.

May I take this opportunity to congratulate all the graduands who are receiving their diplomas and degrees on this important occasion in the University calendar.

The Faculty of Engineering and Technology (FET) has made major milestones towards accrediting three of its programmes by the Engineers Board of Kenya (EBK). These are Bachelor of Science degrees in Civil and Environmental Engineering, Electrical and Control Engineering, and Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering. The other programme in the Faculty is Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Engineering which is already accredited by the Board.

The accreditation of Engineering Programmes is a legal requirement, as stated in the Engineers Act 2011. The conditions for accreditation include, but are not limited to, having an approved programme by the Board, physical facilities and equipment, and adequate staff.

Upon review of the submissions made towards the end of last year, the Board found that both Civil and Environmental Engineering, as well as Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering programmes, were sufficient and cover the required thematic areas adequately. Therefore, for these programmes, the relevant departments are working on defining the remedial courses for their graduates, so that classes can commence once accreditation is granted by the Board.

On staffing, we are filling the gap by hiring Adjunct Professors for all the three departments. In addition, in order to ensure that we close the staffing issue in the near future, we are continuously recruiting registered

FERD Steps up Riverine Conservation

Egerton University, through the Faculty of Environment and Resources Development (FERD), has been rehabilitating the Mau Catchment for a decade now, by, among other activities, planting trees at Sururu area. In addition, in the year 2012, the University committed itself to rehabilitate and conserve the Njoro River, which emanates from the same catchment. Njoro River has been degraded by the neighbouring community, which has encroached on its riverbanks as well as the catchment area. It is the major source of water for Lake Nakuru and a shared resource by the community of Narok and Nakuru counties.

The University has been rehabilitating the river through planting of riparian

tree seedlings, clearing of dump sites, controlling dumping of wastes and water quality monitoring. Other activities include support for community-based initiatives such as establishment of tree nurseries, construction of watering troughs, community training on environment, involvement of primary school pupils in rehabilitation and community sensitisations through the Agricultural Society of Kenya (ASK).

On 12 January 2018, the University held a stakeholders' workshop on rehabilitation that was attended by more than 100 participants drawn from various organisations – such as APA Insurance, KCB, KALRO, Medihealth, and AAR. The event was graced by H. E. Lee Kinyanjui, the Governor of

Nakuru County. The climax was an athletic event, “Run for Mau”, which was conducted on 10 February 2018 and brought together stakeholders from across the board for the common purpose of conserving the larger Mau Catchment. Two community sensitisation workshops were also held between February and April this year.

The University marked the World Water Day on 2 March 2018 at Ndarugu Primary School, Njoro, where more than 1,500 tree seedlings were planted. The event was organised by the County Government of Nakuru. In addition, between March and May 2018, the University planted close to 5,000 tree seedlings along the Njoro River.

Bountiful Harvest at FERD with Five Associate Professors at a Go

FERD is in a celebratory mood following the promotion of five Senior Lecturers to Associate Professors in May 2018. These are: Gilbert O. Obwoyere, Wilkister N. Moturi, Paul M. Makenzi, George M. Ogendi, and Elias K. Maranga. This achievement has boosted the capacity of the Faculty in the delivery of its core mandate, i.e. teaching, research, and extension. The mentorship programme at the Faculty will also be enhanced with this cadre of staff. Short Courses

The Faculty endeavours to provide high-end skills to professionals in the spheres of development. 
research and planning in the contemporary society. The Department remains keen on up-scaling the training in GIS to our staff, students and other practitioners. We

Their triumph is the outcome of their hard work and that of staff of the Faculty, despite the major challenge of industrial unrest of university staff, doctors and nurses, which delayed their completion of studies.

The FHS is proud to be associated with our graduands and alumni. This is mainly derived from the never-ending pursuit and commitment to the provision of quality higher education and scientific undertakings. We are convinced that the hands-on orientation of our academic programmes and research acquaintance provide sufficient foundation to measure up to the expectations in the labour market.

To ensure that FHS remains competitive, new initiatives are being pursued aimed at providing the best curricula that equip learners with unsurpassed quality education. In particular, the Faculty has embarked on simulation-based training to enhance the students' clinical skills. In view of this, the Faculty has attracted

funding from Rotary International and Laerdal grants to use simulation-based training to enhance maternal and neonatal outcome (EMNOC) in Nakuru County by training healthcare workers and students on helping newborn babies breathe, continuous positive airway pressure (cpap), and maternal and neonatal emergency.

In addition, FHS has three memoranda of understanding with Tel Aviv University, Utah University and Friends of Naivasha to build and expand the Faculty's capacity in simulation-based training and help in setting up a state of the art regional simulation centre. We also have a

collaboration with the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine (LSTM) "Making it Happen Programme" that aims at increasing the capacity of pre-service training institutions to provide quality skills and drills in EMNOC training. So far, the Faculty has received EMNOC training equipment. Members from the Faculty have also undergone a trainer of trainers EMNOC course and the first batch of sixth-year students have undergone a one-week basic EMNOC training.

Once again, I congratulate our graduands today. May God bless you all in your future endeavours.

Department of Surgery in Collaboration with International Scholars on Trauma Course

On 26-27 January 2018 the Department of Surgery conducted a course in Trauma Evaluation and Management (TEAM) for the sixth-year students who have just completed their MBChB programme. The aim of the course was to introduce the concepts of trauma assessment and management to medical students during their clinical years. The core content was adopted from a course developed by the

American College of Surgeons (ACS) Advanced Trauma Life Support (ATLS). The course was organised by Prof. Jana MacLeod of Kenyatta University's Department of Surgery and Dr. Petter Tonseth, a Clinical Assistant Professor of Radiology from the University of British Columbia, Canada, in collaboration with Egerton's Department of Surgery.

As you join our alumni, it is our hope that the training and mentorship that you have received during your study period has fully equipped you with knowledge, skills and attitude that will enable you to go out into the world and make a difference. We trust that you have been transformed and prepared for the job market, and as you leave here we hope that you are infused with the desire and determination to achieve and to succeed wherever you will find yourselves.

As we mark this milestone in our development as a faculty, I would like to assure the University Community that we will continue to offer quality education through our 31 undergraduate and postgraduate programmes. We will continue to review our programmes and to bring on board more of them in response to the dynamic nature of science and technology. As a faculty we will always endeavour to put our best foot forward for our students, as well as to provide the best transformative education and training a university can offer.

In the last Graduation the pioneer Bachelor of Science in Statistics class graduated. Among the graduands were 15 male and 13 female students. The coveted first class honours had three graduands, all of whom were women! The persistent belief that women

cannot excel in Mathematics was negated! As a quality assurance measure, the Faculty, through the Department of Mathematics and in conjunction with the University Directorate for Quality Assurance, has embarked on a self-assessment exercise for the programme, whereby different stakeholders will be involved.

At the same time, the inaugural Bachelor of Science in Actuarial Science class is currently in its final semester, and the students concerned are expected to graduate during the next congregation. This will increase the number of our programmes that have gone through a full cycle.

Not only have our staff continued to execute our core mandate through dissemination of knowledge through teaching but they have also been generating new knowledge through research. The Faculty is currently implementing a number of NRF-funded projects, among other collaborative initiatives. They include eight postgraduate projects and four multi-disciplinary projects that are being led by Prof. J. Matasyoh, Prof. J. Kipkemboi, Dr. M. Obonyo and Dr. S. Abwao. One of them consists of a Wireless Sensor Network, a collaborative project on environmental monitoring of aquatic ecosystems based on innovative, real-time wireless sensor technology.

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Message from the Dean, Faculty of Science

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The partners in the project are drawn from diverse scientific backgrounds, such as aquatic sciences, physics and sensor technologies, and information and communication technology. Some are from Egerton and some are from other institutions. Those from Egerton are drawn from the departments of Computer Science; Biological Sciences; Physics; and Information, Communication and Technology (ICT). The external partners include the Kenya Wildlife Service, Kenya Education Network (KENET), and Moi University.

The project will set up wireless sensor infrastructure as well as a database to go with it. The data generated will be used to guide policy decisions on aquatic resource management. The aim is twofold: first, to achieve fast, high frequency, real time, and cost-effective data collection for aquatic ecosystem monitoring infrastructure on the basis of emerging ICT technology; and, second, to contribute significantly to developments in

human and infrastructural capacity for wireless sensor technology in Kenya.

As a faculty, we have also continued, through participation in Kenya Science and Engineering Fairs (KSEF), to reach out to potential science students in our determination to inspire them to study harder. For example, from 23 to 25 March, we were able to reach 612 students from 166 schools in fourteen counties in the Rift Valley region who participated in this year's fair. Among other things, we communicated to them and their teachers important information about science and other programmes offered at Egerton University. Furthermore, on behalf of the University, we presented trophies for the best categories in Mathematical Science; Computer Science; Biology and Biotechnology; Physics; Chemistry; Environmental Science and Management; Agriculture; Food Technology and Home Economics; Engineering, Energy and Transportation; and Technology and

Applied Technology. Finally, we distributed Faculty and University programme brochures to the public through the County Secretariat of the KSEF and County officials present. At the request of KSEF, one of our staff members, Dr. Ronald Rop, was a regional Chief Judge for the fair.

As you join our alumni out there, we would like to wish you the very best. We hope that you will make a difference in the larger society, that you will continue to uphold our institutional core values, and, in general, that you will be good ambassadors of your alma mater. Remember to never stop trying and to never stop learning. You are always welcome back to pursue further education with us. May great opportunities come your way, and may you achieve success in all of them.

International Masters Programme Enters Its Sixth Year

Last year, in October, the Faculty of Science's Limnology and Wetland Management (LWM) Programme received its sixth cohort of students. This year, the Faculty, through the Department of Biological Sciences, received 20 students from 10 countries: Kenya, Uganda, Ethiopia, Zambia, Nicaragua, Bangladesh, Austria, Nepal, Germany, and Romania. Of the students, 13 are enrolled in the Joint Masters in LWM programme and two in the Master of Science in Limnology programme, while five (who come from Boku) are taking short courses/modules relevant to their studies in Applied Limnology while also touring East Africa.

Traditionally, the students pursuing the LWM programme are enrolled into the programme through admission procedures conducted jointly by the three partner institutions, namely BOKU (Vienna), Egerton (Kenya), and IHE-Delft Institute for Water Education (The Netherlands). The first trimester of the programme, which ended in January 2018, took place in Boku. Subsequently, at the beginning of February 2018, the students travelled to Egerton. They were part of the group of students who actively participated in the Mau-Egerton Cross-Country this year.

Their Kenyan trimester programme

commenced well. Their first module was in Lake Ecology. It consisted of lectures by different experts in the field of limnology, hydrology, phytoplankton, zooplankton, and nutrient dynamics. In addition, the students travelled to different fresh and salty water bodies in the Great Rift Valley. The module concluded with an excursion to the coastal towns of Mombasa and Watamu, an opportunity for the international students to have a touristic experience of Kenya from an academic perspective.

The Stream and River Ecology Module places emphasis on the ecology and life

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in running waters. The study sites for the module consisted of the Njoro and Naromoru rivers. In the Wetlands for Water Quality Module, the students worked in different systems, including a natural wetland in Kericho and a constructed wetland on James Finlay's floriculture farm.

Fisheries and Aquaculture entails extensive fieldwork and excursions. The students interact with farmers practising different levels of fish farming – from subsistence to high commercial levels. Practical training is conducted in top government aquaculture and fisheries research institutions, including the National Aquaculture Research and Training Centre in Sagana and the Kenya Marine and Fisheries Research Institute in Kisumu.

Following their completion of the programme, the students can graduate in any of the three partner institutions within the same timeframe.

respect to her colleagues in Boku and IHE-Delft, she has completed her work within the scheduled period of 18 months.

With respect to Electrical Engineering in particular, we will hire more graduate assistants and have Adjunct Professors mentor them to ensure staff adequacy in the short run.

On physical facilities, the Faculty is now working on an initiative to mobilise resources through market-driven programmes and professional service provision. The programmes include Bachelor of Industrial Technology, Diploma in Mechanical Engineering, Diploma in Agricultural Engineering, Bachelor of Technology in Irrigation Systems and Management, Bachelor of Technology in Civil Engineering, and Diploma in Civil Engineering.

The programmes will improve the competencies of practicing Engineers and Technicians in order to accelerate the process of industrialization. This, together with the recent KUCCPS admission (whereby three of the four Engineering departments achieved or surpassed their declared capacities), informed further development and expansion of the programmes.

The Faculty is increasingly getting involved in Engineering assignments, the most recent one being the design and supervision of the planned CESAAM Complex and the Ahero Foot Bridge.

In addition, our departments are working with various partners to train personnel in a number of Engineering services. For example, the

Department of Industrial and Energy Engineering is currently engaged in Energy audit together with Eenovators, an international Energy Audit Company.

Under the supervision of the professional Engineers in the Faculty, including the Adjunct Professors, staff members will find opportunities to undertake projects leading to their registration as Professional Engineers even as students will be registering upon graduation as Graduate Engineers. Thus, for prospective skilled engineering professionals and academicians alike, FET Egerton is the place to be if their dreams are to be fulfilled.

Once again, congratulations to the graduands for their well-deserved achievements.

Message from the Director

Graduation is here again, and we celebrate the achievements of the graduands of this 38th Graduation Ceremony. Graduation is an important milestone in academic life both for the graduands and the University as it sums up the effort invested by each candidate in their study and that of the academic staff and departments that have facilitated successful completion of the academic cycle. As a Directorate we are proud to be associated with the graduands today, especially those who are graduating from our various undergraduate programmes.

The Board of Undergraduate Studies and Field Attachment Programmes (BUGS/FAP) is responsible for the review of, and recommendation to the Senate on, the quality of undergraduate degree and diploma curricula. The Board also coordinates and facilitates field/industrial attachment (FA) and teaching practice (TP). As such, BUGS interacts with undergraduate students long before they set into class, as the students select their programmes of study and also during industrial/field attachment.

In the Farm Attachment Programme

(FAP), students are attached on farms where they work with the farmers and are expected to make meaningful gains in implementing relevant projects and activities on the farm just like they would do if attached in organisations. Feedback from the students emphasised the need for reliable, unbiased sources of agricultural information to farmers. This was key in motivating BUGS to come with the Farm Up Connect (farmup.egerton.ac.ke), an online platform that will be beneficial not only to the farmers but to other stakeholders in agriculture as well. The platform is hosted on the University website under the Division of Research and Extension and currently has content on production and marketing issues for maize, potato, dairy, poultry and a few other selected cross-cutting issues. In May 2018, 1366 students proceeded on TP.

Egerton University has partnered with Arava International Agricultural Training Centre (AICAT) in Israel to provide hands-on skills for students

undertaking agricultural related sciences. The 11-month programme provides selected students with an opportunity to be attached to farms and farmer organisations in the Arava region of Israel for five days in a week, and one day training at the AICAT Centre.

The 2016-2017 cohort (the fourth cohort) started in August 2017 and comprises of 100 students drawn mainly from Egerton University, the Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT), the National Irrigation Board (NIB) and the Kenya Water Institute (KEWI). They include 31 Egerton University students who are currently in nine locations in Israel. Most of the students are involved in field work or in the packing factories, usually within each farm or group of farms. They will complete the internship programme in June 2018. The fifth cohort of 40 students is currently in progress and is expected to report in Israel at the end of June.



Message from the Director

Today marks an auspicious occasion for our graduating students as they celebrate this major milestone in their academic life in the University. In this regard, the Directorate of Examination and Timetabling wishes to heartily congratulate all our students for the hard work they have put in their studies. The Directorate falls under the Division of Academic Affairs and plays a critical role in the academic life of students in the University. It is charged with a number of responsibilities, the two major ones being: to ensure that teaching and learning takes place in a conducive and friendly environment, and that University examinations are processed and administered in a way that is credible and inspires confidence among all stakeholders. The Directorate prepares the University Academic Calendar for Senate for approval and also ensures that teaching and examination timetables are prepared on time. The Directorate in consultation with the Office of the Registrar Academic Affairs is also charged with the responsibility of ensuring that all University examinations are moderated.

Moderation involves processes which assure high quality assessment practices, including external benchmarking,

Moderation is done internally and externally for both undergraduate and postgraduate assessment. It is an internal control activity carried out at the Department level by a small team of senior staff members focused in particular areas of specialisation to ensure that assessment activities meet the required standards. External Examiners on the other hand are recruited in a rigorous vetting process. This pool consists of professionals in the same areas of specialisation drawn from the academia, research and industry. Their role is to ensure consistency, comparability and fairness of professional judgments about the levels demonstrated by students.

Moderation essentially operates at two levels: at the assessment setting stage when the examination is being prepared and after marking and processing of the final results. The aim of moderating examinations before students are asked to sit for them is to address any ambiguities, vagueness, depth of coverage, time allocation etc as these are some of the issues which might cause concern to students and

hinder them from achieving their level best when being evaluated.

After marking the External Examiners look at the whole marking process to see if it was done professionally and fairly. The External Examiner's main role is to audit/validate the whole examination process from setting through marking to final grading to ensure fairness, accuracy and consistency in the evaluation process.

For the postgraduate programmes, the mandatory involvement of at least one External Examiner in marking of Masters and Ph.D. theses and the requirement for the personal presence of the examiner during a Doctorate thesis defense is a further testimony of rigorous moderation in the evaluation process at that level.

A thorough and credible examination and moderation process at all levels does not come cheaply. The University has found itself committing significant financial resources for this important exercise. Overtime, the University has continued to support this important process wholeheartedly by ensuring that the terms of engagement of External Examiners are improved significantly and in commensuration with the assignment.

Over time the College has expanded and now admits Government-sponsored students for Bachelor of Library and Information Science, Bachelor of Arts (Communication and Media), Bachelor of Criminology and Security Studies, Bachelor of Procurement and Supply Chain Management, Bachelor of Enterprise and Small Business Management, and Bachelor of Laws. There are three fully-fledged Faculties that include the Faculty of Commerce, Faculty of Health Sciences, and Faculty of Law. The College also offers programmes in six more Faculties based at the main campus at Njoro.

The College has launched three new academic programmes: Diploma in Journalism and Mass Communication, Diploma in Criminology and Security Studies, and Diploma in Public Relations and Mass Communication. These were scheduled to admit students for the May 2018 intake. The Faculty of Law is in the process of developing Diploma, Masters and Ph.D. programmes to supplement the current Bachelor of Law Programme. The College is also in the process of starting a course in Chinese language that will enhance our students' ability to enrol into Chinese universities and colleges for further studies.

The Faculty of Health Sciences continues to expand its intake on a

yearly basis, with more students graduating. Recently, on 8 May 2018, medical students participated in a Ceremony whereby the graduating class of doctors, clinical officers and nurses took their Hippocratic Oath. Chemeron Dryland Research Training and Ecotourism Centre

Message from the Director

May I take this opportunity, on behalf of the Dryland Research Training and Ecotourism Centre (DRTEC), Chemeron, to congratulate all graduands of the 38th Graduation Ceremony for this milestone achievement. The journey has been long, winding and sometimes slippery; but in the end you have emerged victorious! We applaud you and acknowledge the sacrifices that you made over the years coupled with discipline and determination and culminating in today's celebration. We are confident that the knowledge and skills you have received during your training at Egerton University will enable you to touch many lives in various parts of our country. Welcome aboard, and let's join hands and utilise the acquired knowledge and skills in the realisation of the Sustainable Development Goals as well as Kenya's Vision 2030.

The DRTEC is an interdisciplinary research and coordination centre for Egerton University and is rooted within the Strategic Plan of the University. It focuses mainly on applied dryland research as a contribution to the national efforts of enhancing livelihoods and improving

food security in the arid and semi-arid lands of Kenya. The DRTEC coordinates the implementation and scientific steering of dryland research projects related to agriculture, horticulture, soil and water conservation, livestock keeping, bee keeping, rangeland management, climate change, and ecotourism, among others. The Centre also offers internship and field attachment placement for young people from various tertiary training institutions.

In the last two years, a Nature Park has been established at the Centre that houses a Botanic Garden and a number of caged animals. Among them are crocodiles, six species of snakes (vipers, speckled sand snake, red-beaked, house snakes, Kenyan sand-boa, and pythons), four species of tortoises (leopard, pancake, hinge-back and marsh terrapins), guinea fowls, rabbits, rats, and two species of lizards (Nile monitors and Savanna monitors). The latest additions to the Nature Park are ostriches and the establishment of an Aloe Garden. The Nature Park has been established for enhancing tourism and conservation education and research on wildlife

resources found in Arid and Semi-Arid Lands.

We are happy to report that the results of a four-year rangeland rehabilitation and restoration programme through afforestation and rangeland reseeding at the DRTEC are impressive. This project was geared towards rehabilitating and restoring the area that had experienced land degradation attributable to overgrazing, soil erosion and thus reduced range condition. Seedlings of five tree species, namely Neem, Jatropha, Kassod tree, Leuceana, and the Flamboyant tree, as well as seeds of Buffel grass, were planted within the ten-acre enclosures at the Centre. From these field trials, it is evident that rangeland enclosures can significantly improve on not only vegetation cover but also the amount of forage available to the livestock. Further, it has been demonstrated that Buffel grass (*Cenchrus ciliaris*), and Neem tree (*Azadirachta indica*), Leuceana (*Leuceanaleucocephala*), and Kassod tree (*Senna siamea*) have a huge potential for rangeland reseeding and afforestation programmes in the ASALs of Kenya.


Egerton Collaborates with Confucius Institute on Medicinal Plants

Egerton University, in collaboration with the Confucius Institute at the University, held a workshop on safe methods of utilising medicinal plants from 2 to 5 May 2018 at St. Mary's Pastoral Centre, Nakuru. The University and the Confucius Institute have been holding training workshops for the natural medicine practitioners since 2014. The practitioners are invited from different counties in Kenya. This year they were drawn from Nakuru, Baringo, Uasin Gishu, Bungoma, Embu and Kajiado counties. The trainers include Egerton University researchers and practising Chinese doctors.

One of the new treatment methods covered this year was moxibustion which is very effective in treating rheumatoid arthritis. The treatment combines traditional Chinese medical moxibustion and modern technology. It is an improvement from the earlier form of moxibustion. In this practice part of the body to be treated is identified (acupoint). The moxa is lit up using a matchbox or candle and then placed on the part of the body to be treated (acupoint). It is left to burn for about 10-15 minutes after which the moxa extinguishes and cools off. The ash is collected and the base of the moxa removed from the acupoint. People treated during this workshop have reported great relief on their painful joints and bones.


This treatment is simple and affordable to many people since it uses a common multipurpose herb called mugwort which is a sparsely pubescent perennial herb with pinnate or bipinnate leaves and numerous small paniculate flowers.

The species is found in many parts of the world including Europe, Asia, America, and many African countries. It is one of the plants that have been introduced and conserved in the Egerton University Botanic Garden.

seek to achieve this by rolling out training in January and July every year. This will eventually strengthen the capacity of the Egerton University Community and of practitioners in Kenya and beyond in planning and environmental management. The Department of Environmental Science similarly offers a two-week National Environment Management Authority (NEMA)-accredited Environmental and Social Impact Assessment certificate course in January, May, and August of every year. This course is tailor-made for different levels of graduates.

FERD Scales Its International Credentials in Scholarship and Collaborations

Palgrave McMillan, an International

Publisher, has awarded the Department of Geography a lead role in a book writing project. Six members of the Department will contribute to various chapters in a book titled Urban Development Planning in Africa. The award came hot on the heels of a literature review and writing workshop held on 22 March 2018. The workshop's aim was to prepare participating members on the book writing exercise. The book will be based on a comprehensive synthesis of existing evidence on African experiences in urban development planning. The book will be off the press by the end of 2019. Prof. Francis Wegulo of Geography Department and Dr. Meleckidzedek Khayesi, a

Technical Officer at the World Health Organisation, Geneva, are the editors. FERD is geared towards delivering this book in the next few months. Elsewhere, Dr. Charles Recha was awarded a three-month CV Raman Visiting Fellowship at Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), New Delhi, India, for the period March-May 2018. Dr. Recha previously studied at the School of Environmental Sciences, JNU. Together with his host, Prof. A.P. Dimri, they are undertaking research on droughts of Eastern Kenya. The Indian Government-sponsored fellowship is expected to lead a renewed approach to drought research and teaching, high-end publications, and networking.

In our effort to improve University welfare services for students, employees, clients and visitors, the DUWS has achieved the milestones outlined below in the current fiscal year.

The Catering Department provided catering services for some 450 participants during the Run for the Mau Marathon held in February 2018. The Department has started providing special diets to customers on one-day prior notice terms or on request. Mara and Simba restaurants are now providing buffet regularly to meet the needs of staff, students and visitors. Ready-made boiled githeri is available to students too at a minimal fee. This will save them meal-time preparation as well as save on electric energy costs in kitchenettes.

Students who fall into the category of Persons with Disability (PWD) are being given priority in allocated

accommodation in the Halls of Residence. Those in need are also being provided with prosthetic limbs to ease movement around campus, while ablution facilities have been installed in rooms accommodating them. An embosser that converts/transcribes Braille into printed English is already operational. The PWD Department's Service Charter has also been written in Braille. The PWD Department has received a new coordinator in the person of Dr. Josephine Khaemba from the Department of Literature, Languages and Linguistics. She took over from Mr. C. C. Cheruiyot, who is proceeding on retirement and after serving with great dedication for the wellbeing of PWD.

The Halls of Residence have twenty-six types of hostels, which provide a high number of occupancy options for students. The residency options are made up of single, double, triple, quadruple, pentagon and hexagon occupancy, charged at variable costs. Microwaves and fridges have been installed in one select hostel (River View), which is accommodating foreign students. Over 480 pieces of mattresses have been re-bound for use in the different halls.

In conclusion, we wish you all the best that life has to offer to the deserving, and we hope to hear of your wellbeing in future from the various places in which you will be residing.



Egerton's Symbolically Captivating Gate to Open Soon



Egerton University is currently in the concluding stages of the construction of its ultra-modern main gate and associated facilities at the Njoro Campus (see photograph above). The gate consists of the following components: a Central Piece, which comprises a Guard House, a Control Room, and a Watch Tower; a top that crowns the Central Piece and is held up by posts on a circular base; wings on either side of the Central Piece overarching the entrance and exit points of the gate; entrance and exit gates; reception offices, security offices, and a minimart; and a dual carriageway and walkways which stretch for about 100 metres into the University.

The design of the gate and its associated facilities is conceptualised to represent the University in terms of its Vision, Mission, and Core Values. Egerton is a leader in agricultural training, research, and extension, which has positioned itself to contribute considerably to the development of the agricultural sector. The Central Piece represents a tree stem, while the wings stand in for the leaves, which collectively symbolise the niche that the University has carved out for itself in agriculture and the environment.

Besides improving the economy through contributions to agriculture, Egerton recognises the strategic role of research, science and technology, innovation, and community outreach in national development. The structure of the gate underscores the University's commitment to science and technology through the complexity inherent in the forms of the stem and the canopies of leaves.

Once completed, the gate ensemble will also include security features, such as vehicular and pedestrian scanners and CCTV cameras, which will further enhance the importance the University attaches to the development of problem-solving technologies.

The top piece represents the graduation cap, which, within the context of the academy, embodies, perhaps more than any other object, the achievements of a scholar.

The colouring that will be used on the gate and the associated facilities will, in general, be derived from the University's brand colours and will merge with the environment, thereby underscoring Egerton's dedication to the conservation of the environment.

The construction of the gate is expected to be completed soon.

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
